Consumers see natural gas as important to the restaurant industry and any ban on it would impact the industry's overall success.

- Seven in ten consumers feel that natural gas is important to the industry, including a majority of adults across age groups, income levels, and regions.
 - Half of consumers feel a natural gas ban would have an impact on the overall price of food (49%) while two in five feel a ban would have an impact on the taste of the food, (42%), the quality (42%) of the food, and consumers' overall experience (41%).
 - Additionally, <u>a third of consumers (33%) reported</u> that if natural gas were to be banned in restaurants, <u>it would impact their decision to return to the restaurant.</u>

Consumers showed strong levels of concern over the impacts of a natural gas ban and the impact it might have on the restaurant industry.



After hearing about the impacts of banning natural gas connections, consumers are more opposed to the ban than they were at the beginning of the survey.

- Opposition to banning natural gas connections increased by 12% among adults. Additionally, opposition increased across age groups, income levels, and regions. The strongest gains in opposition were among younger adults.
- Opposition to banning natural gas connections remains bipartisan with a majority of Democrats (51% oppose), independents (58%), and Republicans (74%) continuing to oppose it.



Some cities are currently considering policies that would ban natural gas connections for businesses. Do you support or oppose banning natural gas connections for businesses?

Methodology: This poll was conducted between September 30-October 2, 2022 among a sample of 2210 Adults. The interviews were conducted online and the data were weighted to approximate a target sample of Adults based on gender, age, race, educational attainment, and region. Results from the full survey have a margin of error of plus or minus 2 percentage points.
