BACKGROUND

POLICY BRIEF SERIES

WOTC is a federal tax credit available to employers who hire individuals from designated groups who have consistently faced barriers to employment. WOTC helps many unemployed find work in restaurants and hospitality.

In 2022,

2.5M+ total WOTCs were issued, according to the U.S. Dept. of Labor.

In June 2024, there were **866K jobs openings** in the accommodation and foodservice industries.

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RESTAURANT OPERATORS SUPPORT WOTC

The restaurant industry has job opportunities for everyone. **Since 1995, industry employers have used the bipartisan Work Opportunity Tax Credit (WOTC)** to support a bridge to economic success for U.S. military veterans, long-term unemployed, individuals on public assistance, and justice-involved individuals.

Congress should expand and improve this vital tool for restaurant operators. WOTC expires at the end of 2025, putting millions of people on a steeper pathway to employment, possibly increasing their reliance on government assistance.

WHY WOTC MATTERS TO RESTAURANTS

The restaurant industry is the second-largest private employer in the U.S., employing more than 15.5 million people. Entry-level restaurant jobs can lead to lasting careers or provide a springboard into other career fields. WOTC can be used by a restaurant operator when filling temporary, seasonal, part-time, and full-time opportunities.

WHY WOTC IS VALUABLE

In addition to boosting employment prospects, the WOTC program saved federal and state governments \$20.2 billion in annual entitlement spending in 2018. For employers, the WOTC general business credit for most new hires is \$2,400.

HOW WOTC WORKS

A restaurant operator or other employer checks on the WOTC-eligible status of a job candidate with their state. The employer has 28 days from the start date to file paperwork with the state workforce agency.

IMPROVING WOTC FOR THE FUTURE

The Association supports the Improve and Enhance the Work Opportunity Tax Credit Act of 2023 (H.R. 6833), introduced by Reps. Lloyd Smucker (R-PA) and Terri Sewell (D-AL). The bipartisan legislation would 1) boost the tax credit value from 40% to 50% of qualified wages; 2) add a second level of credit for employees who work 400+ hours in their first year; and 3) end the arbitrary age cap that prevents certain workers over 39 years of age from qualifying for WOTC.
